Definitely the patient contact and developing a real relationship with them. Nursing helps define who I am along with being a wife, a daughter and a mother. It never has been just a job to me




Doing baby vaccinations and making them cry is always a bit of a struggle

The Survey Results Are In...



As most of you will be aware, the PCN recently sent out texts to all of our patients across four of the practices asking them to complete a simple questionnaire about our Extended Access service. We also sent postal surveys to some patients that did not have a mobile number listed on their records. They were invited to comment on their

experiences and any barriers they may face in getting to their individual practice as well as share their thoughts on attending the Extended Access service. We had a reasonably good response and generally, patients were asking to be seen by a GP face to face again. Over 50% of respondents said they were either likely or extremely likely to recommend their GP practice to family and friends. All managers have been sent their results individually so they can be discussed with each practice and their staff.
